I won't go into too much detail as our Chairman, Cllr David White has reported on this on page 22 we are now working more closely and regularly with the relevant parties to resolve the flooding issues and will continue to do so.

Before Christmas we hosted Young at Christmas lunch, serving over 70 Christmas lunches to our members who thoroughly enjoyed it (see page 31). Then a week later we had the Hellihubs Christmas morning with Santa, who delivered some brilliant book gifts to each baby/toddler, it was truly magical, see page 14 for photos. Then the Hub and council office shut for 10 days for a well-earned rest! Whilst we were recovering, the Hub had a much needed repaint, thank you so much to the team from David Webster Decorating for giving up their time during the Christmas break to do this.

On another very sad note, we have seen an increase in vandalism at the Hub and in the Country Park, we believe that it is likely that someone knows the culprits and we would like to work together to try to stop this. It costs money to repair and replace the vandalised property, and it is an unnecessary use of Parish money. The Community Hub was built for the community to use and enjoy and not to be a drain on resources. (more on page 15).

To reassure residents, we are working closely with PCSO Joel and his colleagues to prevent

these incidents happening, the police will be making more regular visits to the Hub and the Country Park to keep a closer watch.


A HUGE thank you to our Groundsman, Adrian.

Hellingly Parish Council's Public Open Spaces For All To Enjoy

The Parish Council are responsible for the upkeep and maintenance for many areas within Hellingly.

At present we have the hellingly country park, hellingly community hub grounds, lower horsebridge recreation ground (including newly acquired land) and lower dicker speedway recreation ground

Over the next 12-24 months more open public spaces will be handed over to the Parish Council from the developers in the Parish.

Within the Country Park there are two ponds where the wildlife enjoy living, we have many different species of ducks, birds, and mammals, however, we ask for ALL dogs to be kept on leads around the ponds to protect the wildlife. Please can we also ask that you help us by picking up any deposits left by your dog.

Recently we have had a few incidents of vandalism and attempted break ins, 2 at the Cricket Pavilion and one at the container. Nothing was taken but damage had been caused.

The Hub was also a target for vandalism from a group of youths, this took place under our CCTV so we can identify the group, the police have been informed and the footage passed to the Officers. Please be vigilant when out and about and report anything to the Police that you feel is not as it should be.

Also, within the Parish the Council are responsible for two sets of Allotment Gardens, Roebuck Park Allotments which opened March 2021.

We have 25 plots on the site in the Country Park at Hellingly with Tim Knight our Volunteer Supervisor overseeing the gardens and liaising with the Clerk of the Cemetery & Allotment Committee. Union Corner Allotments opened back in the 1960's we have approximately 90 plots, unfortunately we also have an approximate 18 month waiting list for a plot, but should you wish to add your details please contact: Tina via email at tina_jenner@outlook.com with your full name, address, email address and contact telephone number.

Our Cemetery can be found in North Street, Hellingly, our Groundsman Jay works endlessly during the growing season keeping the grass cut and the Cemetery looking smart. There is a War Memorial situated near the entrance where the Community join together on Remembrance Day in November each year. The Commonwealth War Graves Commission inspect the War Graves within the Cemetery annually, sharing their report with the Parish Council.

BUSINESS CRIME REDUCTION

A week of action took place just before Christmas, to raise awareness of and help to support local businesses against business crime.



During the week a number of proactive patrols took place across the district, with Officers on hand to offer reassurances, support, tips and tools surrounding all things business crime, as well as supporting owners and staff who may have been the victim of retail violence.

ADDITIONAL ANTI-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR TARGETING PATROLS



Additional patrols aimed at deterring, disrupting and identifying those involved in any anti-social behaviour (ASB) continue into the Spring months.

Teams will be out and about across the district each Friday and Saturday from 3pm – midnight.

Local residents can call the team directly on **07770 700642** to report any anti-social behaviour, including ASB driving they witness across the district.

We continue to encourage residents to report incidents of ASB to us at the time, either by calling 101 or reporting online.

All community reports help to direct additional weekend patrols in areas that have seen an increase in both ASB, and youth related crime and disorder.

OP LIMIT – DRINK/DRUG DRIVE CAMPAIGN Hundreds of motorists were arrested on



suspicion of drink or drug-driving offences during a Sussex Police campaign during December.

Officers from across the force made 261 arrests in Sussex during Operation Limit, a national campaign to tackle drink and drug driving, which ran from December 1 to January 1, sadly a 12 per cent increase on the number of arrests made during the campaign recorded a year before.

Of these over 10 arrests were made across the Wealden district.

During the month of action, Officers across Sussex also carried out nearly 6,000 vehicle checks during the campaign, providing a visible deterrent to offenders and raising awareness of the dangers of driving after consuming alcohol or drugs.

In keeping with previous campaigns, Sussex Police will be publishing the names of some of those convicted to raise awareness and to act as a deterrent to others from committing the same offence, these can be found on our Sussex Police website.

If you suspect someone to be taking to the wheel after consuming alcohol or drugs, call **999** with details of the driver, vehicle and locations, residents can also text these details to **65999**.

You might remember reading the Mr Men books.

Weren't they wonderful? The author, Roger Hargreaves, had a genius for drawing characters in shapes which expressed their behaviour. Mr Messy was a scribble, Mr Tickle had long arms, Mr Happy had a permanent beatific smile etched on his features. Little Miss Tiny was even smaller than Mr Small. Meeting these characters helps us to understand what it is to be messy, tickled, happy or tiny. But Roger Hargreaves was not the first to do this.

The ancients had the same idea and two of their characters spring out from the Jewish and Christian writings: Mr Word and Miss Wisdom. Or to put it in rather more grown-up language: Lady Wisdom and the Word.

Here is Lady Wisdom from the Book of Proverbs:

Does not wisdom call, and does not understanding raise her voice? The Lord created me at the beginning of his work, the first of his acts of long ago. When he established the heavens, I was there, when he marked out the foundations of the earth, then I was beside him, like a master worker.

Anyone could see the beauty and order in nature. Why was the world not chaotic? Because God had injected a ruling principle into mere stuff, transforming it into creatures, order and beauty. This principle was Lady Wisdom. She is beautiful, happy and excited by the loveliness of creation, enjoying it almost like a good friendship. If we were to draw her as a Little Miss character perhaps a human paintbrush would be appropriate for she has worked with God to paint the world with beauty.

Then in the Gospel of John we meet the Word: In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being.

We are told that he has been around as long as God has. From his name we would expect the Word to be telling us something, as that is what words do. The Word is a person whose life tells us what God is like in a way we can begin to understand. If we were to draw him as a Mr Men character a human speech bubble would be right.

In fact Lady Wisdom and the Lord Word are two sides of one coin. Wisdom and Word, feminine and masculine; not separate characters but activities of the unknowable God that our frail minds are able to recognise.

Both characters are the writers' way of affirming that there is order, structure and purpose to the universe, that it is beautifully crafted, that the wise person tries to align their life to this purpose, as this Word is the author of every person's being, and that means living in a certain way.

So this leaves us with some matters to ponder:

- How am I progressing to the true light? What am I doing to deepen my understanding of the true nature of things?
- I have been made by the master craftsman and his helper, Lady Wisdom, who together with the Word have fashioned the universe.
 How well is my life aligned with the needs of creation? Do I live with it or despite it?

These are big questions! And if they can be set out quickly they need a lifetime to answer.

But Lent is coming and now would be a good time to look at them afresh. Easter is a time of rebirth and so let us use Lent to reset our lives in accordance with the desires of Lady Wisdom and The Word.

If you keep these seasons I wish you a very purposeful Lent and a happy Easter when it comes.

These players are backed by the Arts Council with a £10,000 grant. The cast includes professional actors, one from The Old Vic. Just think of it coming to Hellingly- just for us!



Hellingly Youth Hub Update

Hellingly Youth Hub continues to grow and was established in 2022 at Hellingly Community Hub which is engaging with young people in Hellingly and the surrounding areas.

The youth hub has provided a safe place for the young people of Hellingly to come, which has built up confidence, self-esteem with individuals and engaged young people in various activities throughout the year.

The Hellingly Youth Hub is open for school years 6, 7 and 8 from 6.15pm to 7.30pm and school years 9, 10 and 11 from 7.45pm to 9pm.

As the weeks have progressed, attendance of young people continues to increase in both sessions

At the Hellingly Youth Hub, the sessions have been planned each week with activities including crafts, cooking, pool, table tennis, table football, Nintendo Switch and outside activities in the summer for 10- to 16-year-olds.


The sessions have received positive feedback from young people and parents. The attendance now is between 25 to 35 young people per session in the school years 6 to 8. The sessions for school years 9 to 11 have grown between 15 to 20 a session. Total attendance in 2023 amounts to 1,575.

Both groups continue to feed into the Friday Night Project and attending the PGL activity weekend at Windmill Hill, which gives the young people a broader learning opportunity

During the Easter holidays in 2023, the hub introduced school year 5s in transition to year 6 and school year 8s to move up to the older sessions to give growth to both groups. This will be repeated March 2024.

Hailsham Youth Service appointed a new Deputy Youth Service Manager, Joel Cottingham in May 2023 to further progress the service, not only for Hellingly Youth Hub, but Hailsham Youth Service as a whole.

Chair's Report

Flood Report

As I write this piece at the end of the first week of February it is raining again with more rain in the forecast. A brief check on social media tells me that Mill Lane and the fields below the Church are flooded but not Park Road and so far there have been no reports of flooding to Station Road or any disruption to the traffic on the main roads. It is probably too early to be complacent and to claim that the flooding has been resolved but I do believe that we are making progress.

Over the last six months the Parish Council has been instrumental in calling meetings of all of the agencies having responsibility for managing flood risk—the Environment Agency, East Sussex County Council, (as both the local Highway Authority and the Lead Flood Authority), Southern Water, and Wealden District Council. The purpose of those meetings has been first to identify the major areas of flooding within the Parish, second to identify the cause of the floods and third to resolve how to deal with the flood and who is to undertake the work. In those meetings we have had the support of our local MP, Nus Ghani who has by her very attendance brought pressure to bear on resolving the problems. The results of the meetings and the actions taken are reported in full on the Council Website (www.hellingly-pc.org.uk)





The actions are now clear to see. The overflowing sewage in Station Road has been alleviated by Southern Water fitting pumped non return valves to the affected properties, sewer monitors in the drains, and sealing the manhole covers in the roads, The severe flooding at the junction of Park Road and New Road has been alleviated by ESCC Highways clearing the road gullies and jetting the culvert under Park Road, and undertakings by ESCC to regularly inspect the drainage ponds in new road will undoubtedly continue to improve the situation

There is still ongoing work. Southern Water having completed a survey of the properties connected to the sewer in Station Road and sealed the manhole covers in the roads. They have not yet been able to identify the major source of the surface water ingress into the sewer (a major contributory cause of the sewer floods). They are still investigating the possible use of the former Hellingly Hospital sewer connection to divert sewer flows from the new development at Swingate Park away from the Station Road sewer and pumping Station.

Work with Southern Water and the Environment Agency has yet to come up with improvements to the Cuckmere River to make the pumping station flood resilient and allow the storm water discharges to operate in times of heavy rainfall and when the river is in flood.

We are not yet there but we have made significant progress. There are other parts of the Parish, New Road and Park Road, in particular, where flooding occurs and these need further work. There are also parts of the Parish such as Mill Lane that by virtue of their low lying nature and their proximity to the river have always flooded, and will always, flood. That is the nature of the Parish. Equally good planning and regular maintenance should ensure that the position is not made any worse.



Where people shop, go out, or travel should not be determined by their disability or additional needs.

I'm always working to secure more funding to support improvements to local infrastructure, services and facilities to make Wealden more inclusive for all residents, and I'm pleased that we have seen some fantastic progress recently.

Thanks to a share of £7 million Government funding. Wealden is able to deliver a boost to the provision of Changing Places toilets, which is an initiative I championed during my time as Transport Minister, and introduced to 22 motorway stations across the UK as part of the Inclusive Transport Strategy. Changing Places toilets are larger accessible toilets with additional equipment and space for carers. The Ashdown Forest Centre was chosen as one of the latest locations to benefit from this investment and I'm pleased to have joined the Conservators of the Ashdown Forest at the official opening. The Ashdown Forest is a jewel in Wealden countryside and this new facility will ensure that it continues to be a welcoming destination, accessible to all visitors.

In more good news, the 1st Horam Scout Group and the 1st Buxted Scout Group have received a share of the Government's Youth Investment Fund, which will deliver a new, fully accessible scout hut in Buxted and support refurbishments of current facilities in Horam. Since last year, Horam communities have also been able to benefit from the completion of Phase 1 of the Get Active Pathway, which has increased opportunities for all-weather physical activities such as cycling, scooting and walking, and enabled those with mobility issues to have better access to exercise locally.

Additionally, easy access to transport is crucial especially in a rural constituency such as Wealden and I'm proud to have secured multimillion-pound accessibility upgrades to Eridge and Crowborough train stations.

As part of the £1.9m project, a new lift, ramp, footbridge and platform refurbishments were delivered at Eridge in 2022. Crowborough train station has undergone similar improvements last year, as part of a £4.7m investment which delivered the installation of two lifts and brand-new footbridge, allowing passengers to get from one platform to another more easily and removing barriers to travel for all members of the local community.

These are all fantastic results for Wealden and I will continue campaigning for more improvements to ensure that our local infrastructure and facilities are accessible for all and fit for the future.



Flooding Report

Nusrat Ghani, MP for Wealden, has welcomed the progress made on preventing flooding and sewage overspills experienced by Hellingly residents in periods of heavy rainfall.

To follow up on previous discussions held most recently in December 2023, another meeting was convened by Hellingly Parish Council and Nusrat last week on site in Hellingly, for representatives of Southern Water, Wealden District Council, East Sussex County Council including Highways and the Environment Agency to provide updates on what action is being taken to address and prevent these ongoing issues.

Since the severe incidents in January 2023, Nusrat has been intensely involved in a series of meetings with local authorities and Southern Water representatives regarding the matter, supporting the Parish Council in pushing for full review of current infrastructure provision, clarity on maintenance responsibilities from each stakeholder, and assessment of the necessary upgrades needed to improve the situation.

Nusrat has welcomed the news that clearing works of the culverts along Park Road have been carried out by Highways, which has reduced flood risk and means that the road is better passable in periods of heavy rain. Additionally, Southern Water advised that the results of their connectivity study of several hundred households in Hellingly are being analysed and further action will take place to assess infrastructure failings and needs for repairs.

Nusrat Ghani: "I welcome the actions taken by Highways to resolve flood issues on Park Road, and efforts by Southern Water to investigate infrastructure failings by conducting a connectivity study. I appreciate that this is a multi-agency issue, but it is regrettable that it has taken a whole year since the major incident last January to get answers and commitments from various stakeholders. I would like to thank Hellingly Parish Council representatives Jenny Hoodless and Cllr David White for their tireless work on the matter and I will continue working with them to

push all authorities to prioritise Hellingly for infrastructure upgrades as well as to ensure that infrastructure maintenance is carried out regularly, to prevent further issues."

Cost of living payment set for February

Eight million people on means-tested benefits will receive a cost-of-living payment in February to help with high bills. Those on low incomes and receiving benefits such as universal credit are eligible.

The £299 payment will be made directly into bank accounts, without the need to make a claim, between 6 and 22 February.

Funding boost to bolster clean skills

Council has welcomed funding that will help boost clean skills and support the county's move to net zero. East Sussex County Council's Employability and Skills Team successfully bid for £240,000 from the Department for Energy Security and Net Zero (DESNZ) to launch to Retrofit Skills East Sussex project.

As the project progresses, it is hoped that a range of activities, such as careers campaigns and subsidised training courses, will be offered to support the Retrofit Skills Plan.

Budget Setting.

In the face of extraordinary demand and pressure, this Council continues to provide vital services that underpin the quality of life for our residents, communities and businesses. The Council Plan, budget and capital programme before you today continue to be built around our priorities of:

- · Driving sustainable economic growth
- · Keeping vulnerable people safe
- · Helping people help themselves
- Making best use of the resources we have, now and for the future

This firm foundation was endorsed by our LGA Peer Challenge and our external auditors' assessment of the value for money our services provide.

We have continued to deliver against our priorities. For example, over the past year we have:

 spent over £300 million with local suppliers;

- delivered improvements to local bus services:
- opened 11 Family Hubs;
- worked with residents to shape the future vision for adult social care through our 'What matters to you' strategy; and
- provided access to higher speed digital infrastructure connections to public sector organisations in East Sussex through the South East Grid network.

The refreshed Council Plan for 2024/25 sets out what we will do to continue delivering our priorities. We have updated the more detailed delivery outcomes which underpin our priorities to ensure they remain up to date.

These are reflected in the plan. Some of the key planned activity includes:

- overseeing the delivery of a new Economic Growth Strategy;
- implementing the new Local Transport Plan;
- piloting key national reforms for support for children and young people with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities:
- Developing our Carbon Reduction and Local nature plans
- continuing to develop a new Connected Families service for teenagers on the edge of care:
- developing a new service to help people think about, plan for and manage their later life; and
- our ongoing work to support the recruitment and retention of staff.

Despite our prudent planning, and the difficult decisions we have previously taken to ensure we live within our means, the escalation in need and costs that we, and other Councils, are facing has not been matched with additional funding.

This means the balanced revenue budget for 24/25 proposed today, with over a £1bn gross expenditure budget and a total net budget of £538m, for the first time, is supported by a

draw on reserves of £14.3m.

In the coming year we will spend £39m on highways taken from the capital programme and revenue. We anticipate an additional £4m from Government to support this work.

Our position is in line with the national expectations delivered by the Minister for Local Government, that Councils will use reserves to maintain services.

The revenue budget incorporates the proposed increase in Council Tax of 2.99% and Adult Social Care Precept of 2%; our residents will therefore see their bills increase by 4.99% or the equivalent of £1.62 per week for a band D property. The increase in Council Tax is not made lightly, particularly given pressure on household budgets, but we have to protect our services now and for the future. Demand for care services continues to grow and, we have little choice but to increase local taxation.

In delivering the budget we are providing over £51m of additional funding for a range of pressures that services are experiencing as they continue to deliver the quality services we all expect, including:


- £36m for contractual inflation and pay awards.
- £4m for population changes in adult social care
- £19m for pressures in children's social care, including Looked After Children and Foster Care Services.
- Given previous savings made, no new savings are proposed as part of this budget.

In addition the 10 year capital programme, provides investment of £837m across schools, highways infrastructure, climate change initiatives, economic interventions and IT. 2024/25 will see total planned capital investment of £96.7m.

The use of reserves is a significant step and is not a sustainable way to balance the budget. Further action will be required in the coming year to address the deficit for the medium term in order to prevent cuts to services while maintaining that balance.

Given the significant financial gap that remains in our financial plan, with a potential £45.3m deficit for 2025/26 alone, our lobbying of Government will also continue to be vital to ensuring we have the resources to support the county's residents in future. We will clearly set out what East Sussex needs and work with partners locally, regionally and nationally to make this case.

I would like to express sincere thanks to our Hellingly team for their dedication, especially at this time of the year when we have turned out in some pretty foul weather!

Our group, with fluorescent jackets and a camera, have now become a regular feature to be seen en post in different parts of the village every week. We have received excellent police support, either on site, or at various meetings initiated by our group, from whom there has been a consistent message that our regular appearance serves as an effective deterrent to those drivers and lorries who speed and cut through the village, in that they now know we will be out, so they are more likely to drive with more care.

While as a group we have now found our stride, we are still limited, given our small numbers, as to the area we can cover. With more volunteers we could extend our remit, especially in areas such as Grove Hill, the Drive and most especially Upper Horsebridge Road at Peakes Garden. Would anyone living in these three areas be willing to volunteer, to boost our numbers so that we can be more effective, and importantly improve road safety where you live? Most especially on Upper Horsebridge Road, where for the few sessions we have monitored here, we noted an exceptionally high rate of speeding.

The training is straightforward, and the task is not onerous, one hour a session, even if it is once a month, our times vary between mornings or late afternoons. Without more volunteers we will not be able to expand to provide for greater road surveillance that could impact upon you and your family within the community.

We are also a cheery group!

Parish Council Grants

In November the Parish Council awarded Grants to local Groups and Organisations who applied, an amount is allocated for Grants under s137 of the Local Government Act each year when the budget is set.

There is a criteria that needs to be met to apply for a Grant, these are:

- The Parish Council, when considering grants, will give priority to those groups and organisations which can demonstrate that other fund-raising efforts have been made.
- Grants will normally only be given towards specific items of expenditure – i.e. equipment or capital projects.
- Requests for grants must be accompanied by either accounts, or business plan if a new organisation or group.
- Grants will not be made for retrospective projects.
- Grants will not normally be made available to commercial or national organisations, statutory bodies or groups from outside the parish unless there are identifiable benefits to residents of the parish.
- All successful applicants will be required to complete an End of Grant Report Form.

This will be sent out with the approval letter. Copies of invoices & receipts will be required.

We had 16 applications in total amounting to £13,720.00 these were awarded to many good causes within the Parish of Hellingly or supporting organisations that benefit Hellingly residents these included:

The Wheatear by Michael Blencowe for Sussex Wildlife Trust

It's been a long winter, but rest assured that our summer migrant birds will soon be with us. As you read this, beating hearts and beating wings are powering tiny bodies through north African skies.

Wheatears are our earliest returning African migrants. It's a fast 3,000-mile flight from sub-Saharan Sierra Leone to Sussex for a 1-ounce Wheatear, and they've been recorded migrating at 500 miles a day. The dashing males arrive first, their soft, sun-bleached shades of pink and buff topped with a dapper black bandit's mask. At Sussex Wildlife Trust's Southerham nature reserve near Lewes, you'll see them scurrying over the grazed downland turf or perched along the valley's fence lines.

When they fly, Wheatears flash the white rump which gives them their name. Because Wheatears have nothing to do with wheat or ears. Their original name...well, courtesy prevents me from writing their old English name in such an upstanding publication – but let's just say they were named after their white behinds. Victorians and vicars bird watching in mixed company blushed when they were called upon to identify one, so their name was subtly censored.

Wheatear is a more palatable name for a tragically palatable bird. In Sussex, Wheatears were considered a local delicacy and were served at the finest banquets in Lewes, Brighton and Eastbourne. Sussex shepherds would trap them to increase their income; in the late 19th Century the birds fetched 3/6d a dozen (£17.50 today). Shepherds could earn £14 per season (£1,260 today) trapping Wheatears - half their annual wage. Around the town, shepherds were eventually banned from trapping Wheatears as it distracted them from their sheep.

Gluttonous gourmets were so desperate for fresh Wheatear that they would prowl the downs and take birds straight from unmanned traps, leaving a pile of coins for the shepherds. In 1900, outspoken and outraged Sussex conservationist W.H Hudson wrote, "It is not fair that Wheatears should be killed merely to

enable London stockbrokers, sporting men, and other gorgeous persons who visit the coast, accompanied by ladies with yellow hair, to feed on them at the big Brighton hotels."

But the damage was done. Trapping and the gradual loss of their sheep-grazed downland habitat caused the birds to disappear from the Sussex downs. The Wheatears we now see around Lewes unsurprisingly don't hang around. Each spring they briefly return to their old downland haunts, flash their behinds at the people of Sussex and keep on moving. From Lewes, they'll head onwards to breeding sites in northern England and northern Europe. But for some of these birds, their amazing migration continues for a further 2,000 miles across cold oceans to Greenland and Arctic Canada.
